Safe Haven Ireland Directors present their annual report for the year ended 31 December 2017. This is Safe Haven Ireland's first annual report since its foundation in 2015, and since its registration as a charity in 2017. The report is accompanied by Safe Haven Ireland's financial statement for 2017. The Directors confirm that the annual report and financial statements comply with the current statutory requirements as well as the requirements of Safe Haven ireland's governing document.



CHAIRPERSON'S STATEMENT

From tiny acorns... Safe Haven Ireland is a product of what happens when you take two entirely different things that you are passionate about and combine them. The whole is greater than the sum of its parts.

I know from personal experience that a sailing voyage is the kind of experience that a young person will remember for a life time. At Safe Haven Ireland we believe that a modern, vibrant Ireland is one that welcomes diversity and cultivates strong community ties. This process starts by extending our *céad mîle fâilte* to newcomers to our shores.

Our sail training voyages are exciting, immersive experiences that break down perceived barriers between different communities and knit together a strong crew on board. The teams that we build on board step off the vessel with changed perceptions about other communities and a greater understanding of the 'other'. We believe the time to act for integration is now, at a time of mass movement within Europe and the wider global community. We are proud to play a small part in building the kind of Ireland we want to live in.

Safe Haven Ireland is privileged to have had the support of an amazing team of volunteers since our inception, as well as the goodwill and support of numerous individuals who came together to help us make the project a reality. Without our major funders, our voyages could not happen, and to them we are extremely grateful. An equally vital part of the process is the donation of time: people volunteering their skills.

Support in kind has ranged from bands like Old Hannah giving their time to play at our first ever fundraiser, kindly hosted by McGarrigles Sligo, to a local lighthouse keeper, Vincent Sweeney, ferrying our young people to and from the vessel in Blacksod, Co. Mayo. Simon Sweeney was our first ever skipper, generously volunteering his time for a week on board our maiden voyage.

We are regularly told by young people "this is the best thing I have ever done". It is that kind of feedback which has been the fuel in our engines, the wind in our sails. Our participants, and their enthusiasm, is what has kept this show on the road through its trials and tribulations and rocky start. We know we are providing life changing experiences to an extremely deserving cross-section of Ireland's young people. We hope to continue to do so for a long time to come. Sail training for all!

Director's report

This is our first annual report as a registered charity. We have decided to take this opportunity to share our journey and where it has taken us until now, shedding some light on what lies at the heart of what we do.

Safe Haven Ireland is a charitable organisation with twin aims: integration and youth development.

We promote integration between communities in Ireland and empower young people from all backgrounds through the medium of sail training.

Our sailing programme provides opportunities for young people from a variety of backgrounds to take part in voyages along the Irish coastline on sail training vessels. We prioritise the inclusion of two groups: (i) ethnic minority groups, such as migrants and refugees, and (ii) Irish young people from inner cities or rural Ireland, who would not otherwise have access to sailing voyages of this kind.

Director's report

Through our programme, we enable the participants to gain much more than sailing skills. They build strong bonds with each other by virtue of a shared experience, which in many cases will go on to have a profound influence in the rest of their lives. The young people educate each other about their backgrounds and different cultures and together forge a new vision for their shared futures on the island of Ireland.

Since Safe Haven Ireland's inception in 2015, we have enabled the participation of more than 110 young people in our programme. Summer 2018 will be our fourth year running the project. We believe that projects such as ours strengthen community ties in Ireland at a time when migration is increasingly part of the national discourse, due in part to the ongoing European 'refugee crisis'. As such, the external environment, the demand within the voluntary and youth sector and that from the community dictate our core ideologies and values.

Integration is so important in modern Ireland – we believe that sail training is an ideal way to foster bonds between communities. All our participants on board tend to live in similar areas, meaning that they have an opportunity to make lasting friendships in their own local community. We hope that the integration benefits ripple through once they return to dry land from their experience through their newfound relationships with each other, their parents and wider social networks.

Several of our participants have remained involved with Safe Haven Ireland and have undertaken training to become Watch Leaders, returning to the project in subsequent years in a leadership role on board. Our trainees have won national awards at the Irish Sail Training Awards: 'Trainee of the Year' 2015 (Ram Rameli) and 'Special Contribution Award' 2016 (Victor Springbok). In 2016 our project was honoured to receive an international award: 'Best Small Sail Training Operator" at the annual Sail Training International Awards. We have been featured in the Irish Times and in videos for CNN and UNHCR.

Through our journey, we have relied on the the support of committed long-term volunteers as well as partner nominating organisations, who continue to help us with the recruitment process. They have enabled us, together with our donors and supporters, to be part of cultivating an inclusive and diverse Ireland.




OUR TRAINEES

Since our inception, we have had trainees of over 17 nationalities on board with us. Our trainees are usually between the ages of 15-21. In order to keep our sailing voyages gender balanced, we aim to have an equal number of girls and boys on board. Nationalities on board have included: Ireland, Syria, DRC, Albania, Afghanistan, Zimbabwe, Nigeria, South Africa, Poland, Kenya, Malaysia, Ghana, Malawi and USA.

The charts below are an indicative of the most frequent nationalities and migration backgrounds which have sailed with us up until 2017. These percentages do not include young people from Ireland. They also do not include the young people we have placed on bursaries to go on voyages offered by other service providers.

Migrant Young people in Safe Haven Ireland voyages





SAILING BENEFITS

Sail training offers participants the opportunity to overcome fears, push boundaries and take on new responsibilities in a challenging environment. Each participant will learn how to steer the boat, set and stow sails, tie knots, follow weather patterns, navigate, and much more. The experience has been shown to promote self-confidence, enhance self-esteem and develop leadership, teamwork and communication skills among participants. For some it may open doors to potential maritime careers, or be an adventure that will have a profound effect on their outlook on life.



2017 IN NUMBERS



#SAILING4ALL

In 2017, we placed 30 trainees in 3 Safe Haven Ireland Sailing voyages, as well as 6 trainees on bursaries with Sail Training Ireland, thanks to generous sponsorship provided by Callan Tansey Solicitors, Mason Hayes & Curran and SeaFest.

We relied on our volunteers for the delivery of the programme. We collaborated with 6 different nominating organisations in order to recruit the young people on board.

VOYAGES IN A NUTSHELL

In 2017 our voyages took us from Sligo to Galway, from Galway to Limerick and then all around West Cork. In total, our trainees spent more than 68 days on board with us, learning how to sail a ship and how to navigate in challenging Irish coastal waters, making their own decisions about what course to plot

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The results for 2017 as show on page shown net operating surplus of $\le 3,245.40$ for 2017.

Our organisation's income for 2017 was €22,395.02 and our expenditure was €19,149.62. We anticipate that in 2018 our overall income may improve as a result of diversifying sources of funding and of employing a part time staff member.

We currently fund our project by undertaking fundraising through (1-) funding applications; (2-) seeking direct sponsorship from corporate and governmental bodies; (3-) seeking out small donations from the public and from referral organisations we work with. Each voyage costs approximately € 6,000.00 to run. Trainee fees are paid by referral organisations.

We continue to seek ways of diversifying our income streams. Our three biggest funders in 2017 were Callan Tansey Solicitors (26.8% of total income) , Mason Hayes & Curran (26.8% of total income) and The Marine Institute (24.5% of total income). Other notable funds include trainee participation fees and donations from our supporters. The trainee fees (50€) are a symbolic amount which we ask from those participating in our voyages every year to ensure commitment on their part.

On the expenditure side, project costs were the biggest outlay (79.9% of total expenditure). We heavily relied on our volunteers (expenses amounted to 4.5% of total expenditure) to deliver the project. Other notable expenditure included additional trainee bursaries (6.2% of total expenditure), which enabled young people to take part in voyages offered by other service providers, such as Sail Training Ireland.
